NOVEC HELPS Sends Employees to Work at Two Local Nonprofit Organizations

NOVEC employees gathered in October for the fifth annual Day of Caring. Organized by NOVEC HELPS, the day of service is the culmination of months of planning, communicating, and delegating. About 40 employees pitched in to help at Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM) and Choice Respectindependence (CRi).

NOVEC HELPS Chair Nan Musick said that they chose to assist two organizations in 2023 because so many employees wanted to give their time. NOVEC employees got right to work cleaning, painting, sorting and packing food, washing vehicles, and helping out with yard work needs across both locations. One team even did a little baking, which was a nice surprise for CRi residents.

"CRi and WFCM kept our volunteers busy," said Musick.

"The volunteer service provided by NOVEC employees was invaluable as WFCM is in the midst of its busy season, including two holiday/school food distributions serving nearly 1,000 local families," said Diane Beatley, WFCM senior manager of community engagement. "We appreciate our long-standing partnership with NOVEC and NOVEC HELPS."

With food pantries in Chantilly and Centreville, WFCM is a community-based human services organization in Fairfax County. Services include providing food, emergency financial housing support via rent and utility assistance,

laundry ministry, nutrition classes, connections to clothing, birthday cakes, financial classes, and health/vaccination clinics.

CRi offers personalized resources to people with developmental disabilities and mental health needs. For more than 45 years, CRi has provided these individuals with specialized services, and home and community support.

FALL FOOD DRIVE

Throughout the month of November, NOVEC employees donated three large boxes of canned food and six bags of dry food items to Northern Virginia Family Services (NVFS). NVFS empowers individuals by offering financial, emotional, and physical well-being services for more than 35,000 individuals to achieve self sufficiency.

TOILETRY DRIVE

During November, NOVEC employees donated 67 pounds of toiletries to Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM). WFCM provides food and financial support to families at risk of hunger and homelessness across western Fairfax County.

HOLIDAY TOY DRIVE

For the holidays, NOVEC employees donated several boxes and bags full of toys and games to Northern Virginia Family Services's SERVE campus in Manassas. This facility provides immediate assistance and programs to help our neighbors develop future success.

SINK OR SWIM AT RESTON MUSEUM CARDBOARD BOAT REGATTA

NOVEC HELPS made a splash by competing in the Reston Museum Cardboard Boat Regatta on Aug. 19. NOVEC HELPS assisted with building two boats, one to compete in for itself, and donated money for a boat for <u>Specially Adapted Resource Clubs (SPARC)</u>. SPARC provides daily programs for adults with disabilities throughout Northern Virginia.

NOVEC employees spent days planning and constructing the S.S. Volt out of cardboard, liquid nails, and duct tape. "The building of the boat started slowly, trying to determine the size of the boat, based on the cardboard pieces we had on hand, and then went faster with the help of all the volunteers," said project leader Pam Rochon. "I'm really proud of how our team came together to build a water-worthy boat in about eight hours. I can't wait until next year!"

Rhy Wiethe, NOVEC digital communications coordinator, took to Lake Anne hesitant at first, but full of competitive spirit. "I was honestly a little nervous that the boat would sink, because I didn't know how the cardboard and duct tape would hold up," Wiethe said. "It was so much fun, and the boat worked just like an actual kayak! Our engineering team did a great job, and I was happy to help out with this great fundraiser."
